Our membership has grown. In conjunction with the town's Centennial of Incorporation, the Society made a series of "picture boards" celebrating the history of various facets of life in "HP" which were displayed at the Library and enjoyed by many at our History Day programs.

All in all, I would say, a jammed packed, fun-filled, historical good year. It didn't just happen though, behind all these wonderful events and memories were a good group of dedicated people who love their "jobs" and made it all happen. We owe all of them a debt of gratitude for their service.

These marvelous memories are now part of our

Old Burying Ground Survey [Davis Ross 768-3621 - ross05@optonline.net]

About 91 years ago the first of the known inventories of the Old Burying Ground was completed. We call that the "DAR" inventory, named after the David Demarest Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, River Edge, NJ April 1957 typescript copy of "Inscriptions from Harrington Park Cemetery copied from Original Records made in 1914." The Rev. Edward Kelder of Englewood Cliffs copied the inscriptions of gravestones which already had been enumerated in 1910. The Rev. Kelder's copy of the inscriptions was the only printed attempt prior to the present to describe the headstones, as opposed to listing the names of the individuals.

In order to have a modern version of the DAR inventory we (John Mager, Davis Ross, and Matthew Ross) have instituted a comprehensive survey of the Old Burying Ground, conducted in March, April and May, 2005. We have completed the first phase of that survey in which we have photographed each head- and foot-stone; noted the type and color of stone used; measured its above ground dimensions; copied the legible inscriptions as they now appear; noted both decorative designs and irregularities of the stones' surfaces; determined the angles of lean from N-S and E-W planes (for stones that are still standing); determined the distance from each headstone to its neighbors to the north, south, east, and west; and recorded its global position as indicated by a GPS receiver.

A comparison of the inscriptions as recorded in 1914 with those still readable by us in 2005 disclosed a few discrepancies. For the most part, the Rev. Kelder and the DAR's transcriber had been quite careful and accurate. Still, in at least one instance, we found one headstone whose inscription – albeit greatly eroded, had been missed. This was for Justin Henry Demarest, an infant who died in 1849. We found the hitherto unrecorded poignant inscription:

> "These ashes poor, this little dust Our Father's care shall keep Till the last angel rise and break, The long and dreary sleep."

For the first time since beginning to work at the Old Burying Ground in 2003, we have done some shallow probing for subsurface remains of headstones and footstones. We have found several "stumps" of headstones which can be identified based on their relative position to extant headstones as listed in the 1914 survey. As a consequence we have identified the 2 headstone locations for the missing Revolutionary War veterans Harmin Blauvelt and Alexander A. Blauvelt. In addition



while searching for 2 other missing stones listed in 1914, John Mager discovered a buried large fragment of one marked "RFD" that had not even been catalogued in the DAR

listing. That even the compilers of that list thought they might not have produced a complete account can be seen in rather poetical sentence from their

preface: "It is said that in it [the Old Burying Ground] lie buried some of the unknown heroes of the War of the American Independence with no stone to give their name or to mark their last resting place, and only the sighing of the wind in the trees overhead, tell of their deeds."

We have begun the second stage of the survey – continuing to probe for other missing head- and foot stones, constructing a computer database to record the results of the survey's 1st stage, and preparing schematic diagrams and maps of the site.
