Old Burying Ground [Davis Ross 768-3621 - ross05@optonline.net]

Over the Summer and Fall much has been accomplished:

- ★ Member **John Mager** has almost single-handedly kept unruly foliage at bay; he has cleaned most of the headstones with a mild detergent Photoflo solution; and he has reset several foot stones which had been dislodged over the years. Member **Greg Evanella** has assisted in removing stumps and saplings which had encroached onto the site.
- ★ The DPW – under **Mark Kiernan's** supervision – has sprayed the area to restrict the spread of poison ivy, making the site safer for clean-up workers and visitors.
- ★ The Society's Executive Committee authorized **A Long-Term Planning Committee for the Cemeteries**. That committee -- chaired by **Davis Ross** with members **Joyce Cornell, Gerri Gibney, John Mager, and Larry Sunden** – has met and begun the process of developing a master plan for the 2 burial grounds. We hope to create guidelines for preservation and maintenance of the sites. We will report back to the Executive Committee as well as make interim reports to Society members.

Revolutionary War veterans: We have obtained copies of the pension files for 2 of the veterans of the American Revolution who were buried at the Old Burying Ground. The records of the two – brothers Harman (1761-1852) and Frederick Blauvelt (1764-1828) – contain interesting information about the men and their families. As an example here's an extract from an affidavit sworn by Harman Blauvelt, dated September 27, 1833:

“[T]he deponent enlisted the latter part of June for six months until the 1st of Jan. 1781 according to the

requirements of the legislature. Besides Colonel Shreves Colonels Ogden Debaut[?] and Barber of the N. Jersey line were with the army when he joined them. General Wayne with his command lay near them; when they went to Tappan General Washington was with them; he had his headquarters at the house of Frederick Blauvelt the uncle of deponent in Tappan; while they lay there Major Andre was captured and hung: LaFayette (called by the army Gen. Le Marquis) was with them also at Tappan and was quartered at a farm house nearby. Baron Steuben was there also instructing the army in tactics and superintending the drills[. D]eponent has often been drilled under his direction. [H]e would sit on his horse and give his views through the officers of the regiment in French or broken English. From Tappan they marched to West Point the Army amounting to about 18,000 men; the deponent then recollects in repairing Fort Putnam and redoubt No. 4 which Arnold had dismounted and dismantled. [A]fter leaving West Point they marched to Pompton and went into winter quarters there. [H]e assisted in building the huts; at the expiration of his time he was solicited to enlist during the war but declined, whereupon the Colonel granted discharges to those who had enlisted until the 1st Jan. 1781. [O]n the last day of December when he left the army and came home, and was engaged there at his trade (a weaver) during the winter; shortly after he left the army there was a mutiny in the Jersey line.”
Harman was awarded a pension of \$33.33 per year; he collected that amount at least until 1846 and possibly until he died at age 91.
